WHAT'S HAPPENING

Scooter and Skateboarding: Make sure children wear a proper fitting helmet, wrist guards, knee pads, elbow pads, and closed-toe shoes that have soles that do not slip. Never ride in the street or hitch a ride from a bicycle, car, truck, bus or other vehicle. Only ride the scooter or skateboard in daylight or best visibility

Make sure your child wears proper fitting helmet, bright colored clothing and reflective gear. Use a white front light and a rear red light at night or when visibility is poor. Check the bike to ensure the brakes, lights, reflectors and tires are working properly. Teach children the rules of the road. Bicycles are considered vehicles and must obey the same rules as motorists.

The Sheriff's Department community liaison officer has asked us to remind the community to call their non-emergency number (703-777-1021) if you see something suspicious happening in the neighborhood. They need to hear about incidents from first-hand witnesses as they can only act on first-hand accounts.

Finally, in the hope that life may be returning to something more like normal in July, it seems a good time to add a reminder to drivers to watch out for pedestrians and cyclists during the summer and for pedestrians to do their part and watch out for vehicles too. Our neighborhood has a lot of on-street parking that restricts visibility for drivers and pedestrians alike. Be safe out there! With less access to recreation facilities, not to mention the weeks of shelter in place that has made us all a little stir crazy, there is likely to be more people out and about as COVID-19 restrictions are gradually eased. Part of being safe is being responsible – wear a helmet if you're biking or skateboarding. Be kind. Be neighborly. Help! My Plant is Under Attack! by Diane Bayless

To me gardening is both relaxation and exercise. I love the quiet time as I sit and pull weeds. I also appreciate the physical exercise of digging, moving plants or rebuilding a retaining wall. I enjoy walking around my garden because it gives me a chance to notice anything that needs my attention or points to my gardening tasks for the day. Sometimes my morning walk points out a problem that leads to my least favorite gardening activity - researching its cause. I have written about diagnosing garden problems before (June 2017) but it is a perpetual concern and regularly generates a number of questions on the Sugarland Run Garden Club Facebook page.

Being a gardener means being a science detective now and then. I teach children the importance of careful observation, asking questions and defining a problem as part of the scientific process which also includes investigating and describing patterns, interpreting data, and developing solutions. A successful gardener has to follow a similar process.

Plant problems can have many causes that often produce similar damage. Therefore, careful observation and consideration of various conditions is essential. First, look for any obvious insects, paying close attention to the underside of leaves and the base of the plant. Remembers, even tiny insects can do considerable damage. If you spot an insect, you must then identify it before deciding how to deal with it. Keep in mind that insects can dramatically change looks as they go through various developmental phases. You do not want to mistake the unsightly larval stage of the helpful ladybug for something more sinister. Do an internet search describing details of the insect and the damage.

If insects do not appear to be the culprit, consider environmental factors such as weather, soil nutrition, water (or lack of), age of plant and what is happening around it. Plants can also be affected by fungal, bacterial and viral diseases. Assessing the extent and type of damage, its location on the plant, and spread can help pin point the cause. Knowing what is causing your plant problem will steer you to the proper solution.
